#### Rough roads to see smooth sailing soon

Three of the worst streets in McMinnville are slated for paving.

"Garfield Street, Hannah Street, and Post Road will be paved when Tinsley Asphalt fires up in April," said McMinnville Public Works

assistant director Brad Hennessee. "That will finish the 2017-18 fiscal year money."

McMinnville officials unanimously accepted a 2018 paving bid from Tinsley Asphalt. The company was the lone bidder. The city department uses a

pavement condition index to categorize streets from worst to best and estimate the cost of each street based on length and the paving rate charged by Tinsley Asphalt during the paving cycle.

Westview Street was on list. Hennessee says Hannah Street bumped it after the streets were inspected.

"Hannah Street replaced Westview Street because of updated PCI results," he said. "Westview and Hannah are similar costs to pave. Westview can be more easily repaired by the concrete spot repair project than Hannah so they were switched."

The city pays for paving projects in fiscal years, from July 1 to June 30. Another proposed paving list will be generated by the department once the McMinnville Board of Mayor and Aldermen approves a budget amount for fiscal year 2018-19.

### **Election** deadlines approaching

The deadline has passed to run for a seat in Warren County government, but prospective candidates still have three more weeks to get their name on the ballot to run for state representative, school board and constable.

When it comes to state government, both seats in the Tennessee House that serve

Warren County are up for grabs.

The 43rd District seat is currently held by Paul Sherrell. It encompasses about two-thirds of Warren County and all of White and Grundy counties. Sherrell, a Sparta Republican, has qualified, along with Democratic challenger Les Trotman of McMinnville and Republican challenger Jerry Lowery of Sparta.
