Speaker says education, job skills produce higher pay

Tennessee Commissioner of Education Candice McQueen projected a bright economic future for the state and Warren County while she praised local business and school leaders Tuesday.

Higher-paying, more secure jobs will result from both traditional education and skills training, Dr. McQueen emphasized in her remarks at a Partners in Education luncheon in the fellowship hall of Central Church of Christ.

'Some communities are moving ahead of others by investing in human capital," McQueen said.

Thanks to a strong relationship between the private sector and schools, Warren County is a conspicuous example of the progress such partnerships can ener-

gize, she affirmed. McQueen credits Gov. Bill Haslam's Drive to 55 initiative as a critical and potent force in moving Tennessee to the top ranks in economic development and the advancement of individuals and communities. The governor's goal is to increase dramatically the number of Tennesseans earning either college degrees or certifications in job skills such as welding or auto mechanics.

McQueen called attention to the Career-Technical Education (CTE) courses at Warren County High School. One such program is Mechatronics, whereby a WCHS senior graduating with a Level I certification

Those graduates have the option of pursuing a Level II certification along with an associate's degree at Motlow State Community College, and then completing a BS in engineering at Middle Tennessee State University. Those students are highly recruited by industry, where management-level positions often pay more than \$100,000 a

High school students who successfully complete job training courses and who sit for the industry certification exams have "a phenomenal opportunity" in the job market, McQeen said. Warren County graduates enjoy an

can go directly into a job extra advantage in having a paying more than \$30,000 a local Tennessee College of Applied Technology, where fundamental skills learned in high school can be further developed, leading to higher certification levels.

"The No. 1 question I am asked by industries thinking about Tennessee for their location or expansion is 'How can I get students in here?'" McOueen said, stressing the need for high schools to partner with manufacturers in creating situations for work experience and on-the-job learning.

Energy Systems Group edged Ameresco as the energy services provider Warren County Schools.

Warren County School Board members began looking into hiring a company to make energy-efficient upgrades throughout the school system and recouping the expense with energy cost savings. Consideration prompted by pending renovation projects at Bobby Ray and West Elementary schools.

A field of several companies was narrowed to three and then two: Energy Systems Group (ESG) and Ameresco.

Both companies provided presentations as part of their bid to win the contract and underwent background checks by Director of Schools Bobby Cox.

"I've followed up with several schools that I know who have worked with ESG," said Cox. "I'm more familiar with them. I checked on references provided by Ameresco. I got a phone call from a superintendent in Kentucky who left me a message. He was very complimentary of Ameresco. I'll open it up for discussion by board members and if you want my recommendation, I'll make it."

Board member Bill Zechman voiced approval for Ameresco.

"When we got down between Ameresco and ESG, both of them are highly qualified highly capable," said Zechman. "Ameresco's analysis of the lifecycle of our buildings ... I was impressed with the software that basically helps us to know when to stop investing in old buildings and go on and build a new one. That was impressive. We try to squeeze every year, month and day out of old buildings and that's just what we do. That's no different from other school districts. I thought that analysis was very impressive."

Ameresco also caught the attention of School Board member Teddy Jones.

"I know ESG has a lot of local support and a lot of local jobs, but I want to say I'm was impressed with Ameresco's effort to woo us. They put up a good presentation and really looked into what the school system has."

Zechman made motion to award the contract to Ameresco, but that is when the switch was flipped.

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
