Consumers optimistic about state's economy

The most recent statewide survey by MTSU's Office of Consumer Research shows Tennessee consumers are even more optimistic about the direction of the economy.

The Tennessee Consumer Outlook Index rose to 240 for March, up from 185 in December and 157 in September 2017.

Tennessee consumers increasingly believe the economy has turned in a positive direction and expect the economy to continue to improve," said Tim Graeff, director of the Office of Consumer Research in MTSU's Jones College of Business. "Such optimism stems from a more favorable outlook on the job market, personal finances, investments, and savings."

The current online survey of 630 Tennessee consumers was conducted March 1-3 with a margin of error of 4 percentage points.

The quarterly survey consists of a series of questions that measure areas such as how consumers feel about the local, state and national economies, as well as their personal financial situations and the job mar-

Graeff noted the growing optimism "can set the stage for future economic growth, given that two-thirds of the U.S. economy is due to consumer spending."

But he cautioned such increased optimism might not necessarily lead to significant increases in spending since some consumers

may choose to reduce debt and credit card increase savings. increased saving can lay the groundwork for future consumer spending, he

Other March report highlights noted by Graeff: Job market: Perceptions of the job market also saw slight improvements. The percent who said jobs in their area are "easy to find" gained to 23 percent from

• U.S economy: The percent of consumers who said business conditions in the country as a whole are "good" rose to 38 percent from 29 in December.

• Savings and credit card debt: The percent of consumers who said compared to last year they are saving "more" rose to 30 percent from 24 in December. Additionally, the percent who expect in 12 months the total amount of their credit card debt to be "lower" increased to 42 percent from 37.

Dark window tint has resulted in an eight-year sentence for a woman with a long criminal history, but she will only have to serve 210 of those days behind bars.

Deanna Sue Baker was ordered to serve 210 days by Circuit Court Judge Bart Stanley for possession of meth with intent to deliver and violation of the habitual traffic offender status.

Charges dismissed due to her plea deal include driving on a suspended license second offense, possession of drug para-

phernalia, possession of a firearm by a convicted felon, possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony, and violation of the window tint law.

Baker was with two other people, Joseph N. Jackson and Vanessa Lute, during her arrest. They were busted after McMinnville police officer Justin Colwell noticed a 2008 Lincoln Navigator traveling east on the bypass with appeared to be illegally dark window tint.

Colwell pulled them over and immediately discovered the driver, Baker, was driving on a revoked license and she

is a habitual traffic offender. She has four past convictions for driving on a revoked license after her license was pulled for a drunk driving conviction in 2009.

Baker was taken into custody and admit-

ted to police she had a small amount of marijuana in her purse. Her admission prompted an all-out search of the vehi-

"During a search of the vehicle, a plastic baggie containing a substantial amount of methamphet-

ed in a purse belonging to Ms. Baker," Colwell, noting the amount weighed There grams. was also marijuana and a digital scale found in a backpack inside the car.

The search continued and netted a portable safe that was on the floor board of the third row of seats in the SUV. Inside the safe was a Smith & Wesson 40-caliber pistol. All three suspects are convicted felons. The cases are being tried separately.



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
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
