No charges filed in shooting death

Fatal incident deemed accident

No charges are expected in the death of an 18-year-old who was shot and killed last

Joshua Dell Smith, 18, died when he was hit with a bullet from a gun being cleaned by his roommate, Dakota Basham,

19. Police initially ruled the death accidental and, upon further investigation, maintain that finding.

"It's been determined to be an accidental shooting," said police detective Todd Rowland. 'We're going to present it to the grand jury to cover what we've done."

In such cases, the grand jury is presented information and determines if there is enough evidence to criminal bring charges, an indictment, against a potendefendant. Charges can still be brought if the grand jury does not indict, but that is not com-

The shooting took place at Bybee Woods, a duplex off Bybee Branch Road. It happened around midnight

Basham was reportedly standing in a

doorway cleaning a pistol and the victim was on the other side of the room when the discharged. Rowland said the gun was a 357 Magnum revolver.

"He was under the impression it had been unloaded but there was a round in the chamber and

when he snapped it, it went off," said Rowland.

Rowland said other people were at the residence at the time. He said their accounts support the claim the shooting was accidental.

Basham has not been hit with any criminal charges.

The incident marked the second deadly shooting in Warren County last week.

A man was shot and killed last Tuesday on Harrison Ferry Mountain.

The Health Science Program at Warren County High School is not for dummies, but it does have a state-of-the-art mannequin.

ALEX, a patient communication simulator, is a mannequin that mimics real patients in order to teach students how to respond to real-life medical situations, including emergencies. It is the first patient simulator to have speech recognition ability and a high-definition camera.

"I think it's definitely going to

be a benefit to future CNAs because you get to see different scenarios," said WCHS senior Gabby Jones, who has plans to continue her training in the medical field after graduation. "It's much better than what we were working with, a basic mannequin that can't interact with

ALEX can see, listen and talk to help medical students with several objectives. This includes: developing critical thinking, conducting initial patient assessments, and acquiring foundational nursing skills.

Viola chase ends in crash

A man who reportedly sped through downtown Viola at 90 mph before flipping his car Thursday morn-

ing has been arrested and faces eight charges, including posses-

sion of meth. Joshua Andrew Biles, 37, was transported first to Saint Thomas River Park Hospital and then to jail where he booked was Thursday after-

noon on \$105,000 bond. The high-speed chase began Thursday morning at 7:20 a.m. when state trooper Wade Myers clocked Biles speeding on Viola Road nears its intersection with Bob Ramsev Road. Biles did not want to stop when he saw the trooper's blue lights as he accelerated in his 2001

Mitsubishi Mirage. "We was going 90 mph through downtown Viola and 95 mph when he wrecked," said Myers, who

watched the crash unfold. "He went off the left side of the road, clipped a telephone pole, and flipped over a couple times before the car landed on its roof."

Biles had turned onto Highway 127 heading to

Hillsboro at the time of the crash. Myers said the entire chase lasted 3.6 miles.

Myers Biles was uncooperative at the scene but he was able to determine his identity. He was also able to find 28 grams of a crystal-like sub-

stance believed to be meth upon a search of his vehicle.

"That's a large amount, enough to consider it possession with intent to distribute," said Myers, who added he believes Biles was intoxicated at the time of the crash.

His charges are driving on a revoked license, DUI, open container, speeding, felony evading with a motor vehicle, reckless driving, possession of drug paraphernalia, and possession of meth with intent to distribute.

An adventurous plan

Officials want to attract more tourists

McMinnville officials have a plan on how to improve adventure tourism development.

Griggs & Maloney, an engineering, planning and environmental consulting firm, provided city officials with a master tourism plan at the request of the McMinnville-Warren County Chamber of

"We've been working on this adventure tourism plan for a while now and we're really excited to pres-

ent it to you," said Ryan Maloney, of Griggs and Maloney, who made the presentation with Kevin Chastine. "We hope this document is a living document. We don't want it to sit on a shelf. We always envision it to be a

sellable tool for the community, something you can leverage internally to the organizations that you guys work with and also as a

selling point when communicating with external developers or in developing public/ private part-

The plan, more than 40 pages, outlined what McMinnville and Warren County currently have to offer tourists, ways to expand into adventure tourism, and ideas on bringing in tourists.

By the plan, "Within 50 miles of McMinnville's Historic Courthouse Square are eight state parks and natural areas, three navi-

gable rivers, and over 125 miles of trails," and those can be used to make McMinnville an adventure tourism destination.
