
# Patels look to clean up in new business

Operating a dry cleaners and a hotel incorporate many of the same elements. Customer service is a top priority in both businesses and doing laundry is a nonstop requirement.

With those similarities in mind, Harry and Rachel Patel have purchased Hale's Dry Cleaners on Lyon Street. The business has been owned for the past 28 years by Gary and Phyllis Harrell.

Harry and Rachel already own McMinnville Inn, a 49-room facility on Sparta Highway, along with another hotel in Cookeville. The chance to buy an established dry cleaners was an opportunity too promising to overlook, they said.

"This is so much like hotel work, only people are not staying over-night," said Rachel. "With a hotel, we are always cleaning, always washing. It's the same thing with this. We are taking people's clothing and they expect us to be responsible with it. There are a lot of irons out there so people could certainly press their clothes at home. They bring it here because they expect it to



be done right."

The Patels have owned McMinnville Inn since 2008. In those 10 years, they have seen their share of stains on towels and bed sheets and worked their magic to get them clean.

Gary could be called a stain doctor for all the clothing he's revived during his years at the cleaners. He says tomato sauce and BBQ sauce are two stains he's removed from clothing in recent days. With an arsenal of chemicals at his disposal, Gary can get out almost any stain, with two exceptions.

"The two toughest stains are fountain pen ink and magic marker ink," said Gary. "It's almost impossible to get those out. We'll try our best, but it's really difficult. Whoever invented the magic marker wanted it to last."

### Toxic impact revealed

HOUSTON (AP) — A toxic onslaught from the nation's petrochemical hub was largely overshadowed by the record-shattering deluge of Hurricane Harvey as residents and first responders struggled to save lives and property.

More than a half-year after floodwaters swamped America's fourth-largest city, the extent of this environmental assault is beginning to surface, while questions about the long-term consequences for human health remain unanswered.

County, state and federal records pieced together by The Associated Press and The Houston Chronicle reveal a far more widespread toxic impact than authorities publicly reported after the storm slammed into the Texas coast in late August and then stalled over the Houston area.

Some 500 chemical plants, 10 refineries and more than 6,670 miles of intertwined oil, gas and chemical pipelines are found in the nation's largest energy corridor.
