The Lady Pioneers return home Thursday for a matchup with Huntland. Action is set to start at 5:30 p.m.



Vols' Kirkland out after 'minor little cleanup'

KNOXVILLE (AP) — Tennessee linebacker Darrin Kirkland Jr. will miss the next two to three weeks of spring practice as he continues his comeback from a knee injury that sidelined him for the entire 2017 season.

Volunteers coach Jeremy Pruitt said Saturday that Kirkland's knee had "a minor little cleanup." Pruitt said Kirkland might return for "the last couple of practices of spring."

Tennessee holds its spring game April 21.

Kirkland was expected to be one of Tennessee's top defensive players last year before the injury knocked him out. He made a combined 16 starts in 2015 and 2016.

Pruitt also said running back Tim Jordan had his appendix removed before spring practice but could return before the end of spring practice. Jordan rushed for 52 yards on 11 carries last season.

After dropping two games Friday in the Ooltewah Invitational, the Lady Pioneers rallied back on Saturday.

Warren County strung together four wins before ultimately falling to Grace Christian in the championship game of the tournament portion of the event. Here's a breakdown of Saturday's games:

WARREN COUNTY HARDIN VALLEY

The Lady Pioneers bounced back from losing their first two pool play games to beat the Lady Hawks in the first game Saturday.

Freshman Sadie Simmons got her first varsity win, going five innings in the shortened game and allowing three runs on five hits while striking out six - the second most for a Lady Pioneer starter this sea-

Fellow freshman Elia Atterson sparked the offense with a two-run double in the second inning, helping the Lady Pioneers build an early 5-1 lead. Rhealee Johnson also had two RBIs in the victory, while Bri Young, Maddie Cantrell and Kaydee Rains each finished with one hit and one RBI.

WARREN COUNTY 4 **LIVINGSTON ACADEMY 3**

In the first tournament game, Warren County broke a late tie with two runs in the sixth inning to defeat the Lady Wildcats.

Ashton Whiles was the hero at the plate, as her two-run homer in the sixth proved to be the difference as the teams took part in international rules for the late innings. The game was played on a

time limit and, upon expiring, teams started with runners on second base each inning to try to break the tie.

Whiles broke it with one swing, sending the first pitch of the sixth over the wall in centerfield to put Warren County ahead 4-2.

Livingston Academy took advantage of its courtesy runner to score in the bottom of the inning, but Maddie Cantrell finished with two strikeouts sandwiched around a fielder's choice to lock up the vic-

Cantrell pitched the final three innings for the win, relieving Johnson after three strong innings.

Kyra Hillis finished with two of her team's four hits, including a triple that knotted the score at 2-2 in the third. Whiles' homer and Grace Rains' double in the fourth were the only other hits for Warren County.

The Lady Pioneers recovered from a six-run third inning by the Lady Chiefs to earn a berth

into the championship game.

Warren County trailed 6-4 entering the fourth, but scored four runs in the frame and three more in the sixth to win and advance.

Mullican knotted the game at 6-6 with a tworun triple, while Young's two-out single in the fourth helped the Lady Pioneers take the lead for good. Emily Mikkola added her own run-scoring single to make it 8-6.

The Lady Pioneers pushed their lead in the sixth on RBI doubles by Johnson and Atterson, along with a run-scoring single by Wood.

It was more than enough for Whiles, who entered after Sequoyah took the lead in the third and shut down the Lady Chargers. Whiles pitched the final three innings and retired nine batters in order, the last two by strikeout to end the game.
