This leads me to a huge dilemma. Am I a Spurs fan, or am I a Kawhi fan?



Kyra Hillis also started her bid for the cycle in the first, roping a single to score Mullican. The senior would finish 4-for-4, finishing just a home run shy of the cycle while driving in two runs.

By the time Grace Rains scored with Savannah Cox with a single, Warren County was up 5-0 before the home team got to bat.

Ashton Whiles worked a clean first inning, then sent shockwaves in the second by starting the home-run barrage. Whiles followed a two-out single by Hillis with a big fly, rocking a 2-2 pitch that cleared the fence and a building behind the field.

"I think it was the longest home run I've ever seen in a fast-pitch game," Martin.
