Judge Bill Locke ruled on the following cases in Traffic Court.

Kristin Glubrecht was ordered to serve 30 days of an 11-month, 29-day sentence for possession of meth.

Joshlyn Renee Hammonds was given 11-29 probation and a \$250 fine for simple possession.

Miguel Martinez was ordered to serve 48 hours of an 11-29 sentence, pay a \$350 fine, and perform 24 hours public service work for DUI.

James R. Phillips was ordered to serve 120 days of an 11-29 sentence, pay a \$1,100 fine, and have his license revoked for six years for DUI third offense.

Courtney J. Stafford was ordered to serve 48 hours of an 11-29 sentence, pay a \$350 fine, and perform 24 hours public service work for DUI.

Kevin G. Weddington was ordered to serve seven days of a six-month sentence for evading arrest.

Blanca Jones was ordered to serve five days of an 11-29 sentence, stay out of Walmart, and pay \$158 restitution for shoplifting.
