# Schools answer nature's call

Warren County Schools is preparing for when nature calls during a lockdown. Each classroom in the school system will be given an emergency bucket with necessities such as toilet paper, first aid kit, duct tape, and a shower curtain. The shower curtain and duct tape can be used to construct a makeshift bathroom.

"Hopefully, we never have to use them," said West Elementary principal

Michelle Lewis. "It's nice to know we have them, just in case."

Director of Schools Bobby Cox says they are preparing for the worst.

"Sadly, this is something our students may have to deal with at some point and we want to make sure they have what they need," said Cox. "There are two different kinds of lockdowns. During a soft lockdown, students can move around inside the building. If the school is on full lockdown, there is no movement inside the building. Students must

stay in their classroom until the lockdown is lifted."

During a full lockdown, students could be stuck in classrooms with no access to food, water or bathrooms. "That is not a good situation for kids and teachers to be in," said school resource officer Jarvis Johnson, who spearheaded the idea of making sure every classroom in the school system has an emergency bucket. "Some classrooms already had an emergency bucket, but not all of them."

More than 400 buckets will be distributed.

Teachers can add other items like hand sanitizer, bottled water, energy bars, and nonperishable food items for their students with dietary restrictions. They can also include card games and puzzles to help keep the children occupied until the lockdown is lifted.

Lockdowns are happening more and more frequently at schools across the country and emergency kits, buckets included, ensure students have what they need during those times.

Debra Fuqua was ordered to serve 30 days of an 11-29 sentence and pay a \$1,500 fine for possession of meth and oxycodone. She was granted a judicial diversion, meaning the charges can be erased from her record.

Michael Shane Billings was ordered to serve five days of an 11-29 sentence for criminal impersonation and drug paraphernalia.

Logan Parker Brady was given 10 days for violating an order of protection.

Natasha R. Burrus was ordered to serve 60 days of an 11-29 sentence for possession of meth.

Christie A. Guerard was ordered to serve four days of an 11-29 sentence for shoplifting and violation of probation. She was ordered to stay out of Walmart.

Eliezer Rostran was given 90 days for violation of probation and making 911 calls in a non-emergency situation.

Lillian Nichole Ward was given 48 hours for simple possession.
