Sherrell announces candidacy for 43rd District Representative

State Rep. Paul Sherrell (R-Sparta) has announced he will seek re-election in 2018 to represent the 43rd District — Grundy, Warren, and White counties — in the Tennessee House of Representatives.

"My family and I are very grateful for the tremendous outpouring of support and encouragement during this process," said Rep. Sherrell. "We are humbled by the overwhelmingly positive comments sent our way."

Sherrell has spearheaded Republican-led efforts to battle Tennessee's opioid crisis. This year, he supported passage of House Bill 1831. 
