

Three men charged with armed robbery at hotel

Suspect's wallet, phone left behind

Three men have been charged with armed robbery after victimizing guests at a local hotel Saturday night.

The fact one of the suspects dropped his wallet and cellphone at the scene aided police investigators.

Robert Nathan Ghrist, 29, along with brothers Matthew Justin Collins, 25, and Lucas Ray Collins, 22,

have all three been charged with aggravated robbery for the incident at America's Best Value Inn on Sunnyside Heights.

According to the warrants for their arrest, the three began to stage the robbery Saturday afternoon when Ghrist made contact with a friend who was staying at the hotel. Ghrist reportedly stopped by his friend's room in the afternoon before returning around 8 p.m. that same night.

"He was acting strangely according to the occupants and very shortly after arrival asked where a Coke machine was and opened the door to get one," the arrest warrant "When Ghrist reads. opened the door, two other Matthew Justin men,

> Collins and Lucas Ray Collins rushed into the room while Ghrist re-entered.'

The three demanded money from the one male and two female occupants of the room.

Ride of Pride to appear at Fairview CIC

Patriotic pride will barrel into Fairview like an 18-wheeler later this month when the community holds its annual Independence Day celebration.

Schneider's Ride of Pride truck will be on hand Saturday, June 23, from 7:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at Community Fairview Center. It's driven by military veteran David Buck.

Ride of Pride will be the centerpiece of Fairview's annual Independence Day celebration, which is always held before July 4. This year the celebration has been moved one Saturday earlier because that was the only scheduling slot the Ride of Pride had available.

Top-secret projects continue to develop

In an attempt to protect the identity of potential projects, the Tourism Development Board continues using code names while giving updates on prospective property developments.

Tourism Development Board member

Mandy Eller gave a brief update on Project Post during Monday's meeting at the Chamber. Project Post could be a reference to VFW Post 5064, a building on Sparta Highway that's been on the market for a couple years.

"Chris, the VP over all fishing, is actually going to be working out of town so we may have to have a teleconference to move forward on that project," said Eller to the other members. "He seemed very positive and Todd said he would love to have a

building on that property so he could bring his manufacturing facility to that building and have it open for tours."

Added board member Michael Griffith, "If Todd was looking at doing a manufacturing facility, I wouldn't care to see if they wanted to do a joint venture, which would help us digest another project a lot quicker. No one else is even remotely interested in this property."

Several board members mentioned the full parking lot of the VFW before Griffith asked if they'd been hearing a lot of push back from the \$5 charge per boat. Several members responded they'd received negative feedback even though Smooth Rapids charges the same amount for river access.

> "Some conversations I had with the fishermen during the Hardly Strictly Musky Tournament in their criticisms of paddlers, one of the things they said was 'we pay to be here for access, yet we go to get in the water and it takes 30 minutes for kayakers to get their stuff together and get out of the way.''

As an avid kayaker, Griffith said that he had a conversation recently with Judd Matheny,

who is a big paddler as well. Griffith is a proponent for the State of Tennessee to implement what the U.S. Fire Service does, which would be an annual tag displayed by paddlers on their life jackets.

tors and a sled they'll be pulling. Rumble in the Valley Truck and Tractor Pull arrives this Saturday, June 16, at 7 p.m. Proceeds benefit Viola Volunteer Fire Department. Adult tickets are \$10. Admission for children 6-12 years old is \$5, while children 5 and under are admitted free. Tickets are
