Rich Pikarz at Stacked Bistro is beginning to subscribe to that logic. He's been operating at Plaza Shopping Center for the past 20 months and will be leaving his brick and mortar restaurant in favor of a food trailer.

"Everything will be the same we just won't have a

dining room," said Rich.
"Probably 80 percent of our business is pickup or delivery so this move makes sense."

Rich says his phone number will stay the same, 474-2222, and free delivery will still be offered throughout the county. He says the only exception will be on Mondays when he is expect-

ing to set up the food truck in Morrison to give employees at Yorozu, Bridgestone and other factories another option.

On the other days Rich says he will be located on The Strip in the area near Free Bird Bail Bonding. He estimates it will be around three weeks or so before the move is complete.

"I could go tomorrow if I wanted, but I want to make sure our customers are aware of the move," said Rich. "I don't want them to show up here and be surprised by a sign on the door."

UNEMPLOYMENT GOES HIGHER

After months of months of historic lows when it comes to unemployment, the downward trend came to a screeching halt Thursday. According to information reported by the state, unemployment increased in all 95 counties in June.

Overall, the statewide unemployment rate was 3.5 percent. That's still lower than the national unemployment rate which is 4.0 percent.

In Warren County, the place we all know and love, unemployment climbed from 3.2 percent to 4.9 percent. That mirrors similar increases in neighboring

In Coffee County, unemployment climbed to 4 percent, up from 3 percent the month before. In DeKalb County, the rate rose from 3.8 percent to 5.0 percent.

Only six counties had an unemployment increase of less than 1 percent. Hancock County had the highest increase with unemployment rising 2.7 percent.
