Tim began his Bridgestone career in Decatur, Ill., where he stayed for 10 years before relocating to the plant in LaVergne. When the plant in Warren County began production in early 1990, Tim was here to see the first tires roll off the line.

The tires and technology have changed so much from when I started," said Tim. "It used to be tires would last 5,000 to 10,000 miles. My dad used to buy new tires before we went on vacation. Now you have passenger tires that get 60,000 to 80,000 miles. And the truck tires we build usually get a quarter of a million miles on them then we'll retread them and they will go another good distance."

Tim is proud of his work at Bridgestone and the company's ability to manufacture more than 9,000 tires a day. "We do things to make the machines dance," said Tim. "Right now we're trying to make every tire we can."

Tim says one piece of machinery, a fabric cutter, has followed him from his first job in Decatur to

Warren County. He says the machine still works well today.

or he can do something less complicated. Cory has more than 40 tattoos on his own body, but admits he's at a good stopping point and doesn't foresee any more designs in the future.

It's also fitting to say Cory is a proud father of two girls, ages 7 and 1, with another child on the way. He says he wants to keep his work schedule at four days a week so he can devote the rest of his time to his family.
