Church sings praises for sewage assistance

A local church may find saving grace when it comes to financial assistance for a sewage crisis cleanup.

The city Water and Sewer Committee met last Tuesday and considered a request from city attorney Tim Pirtle to negotiate with ServePro over a \$17,353 bill from it Mt. Leo Church of Christ to clean the basement after sewer backed up into its

basement.

Pirtle says the city is not liable for damages. However, after reviewing the entire sequence of events, he found items working in the church's favor.

The city initiated the cleanup work with the company.

"We, and when I say we I'm talking about the city of McMinnville, initiated that contact with ServePro on the same day the issue was reported," said Pirtle. "And, maybe, at least started to

undertake some cleanup. Some remediation of the problem."

An insurance adjustor took up to 10 days to determine financial responsibility, so the company started the cleanup effort without a clear understanding of whom would be paying the bill.

"Because there was a delay, five to 10 days as I see it, between the occurrence and the investigation of the claim by the insurance adjustor, there was a gap period there where ServePro was performing work and there had been no determination as to who would be responsible for the bill."

Pirtle disputes the charge. "That bill turned out to be sizeable, a very significant charge based on my experience and based on my conversations with TML Pool (the city's insurance carrier), with the independent adjustor that was at the scene and investigated it, and with other cities in this area that address similar problems."

The church paid the bill and congregation member Terry Mullican came before the Board of Mayor and Aldermen on June 12 seeking reimbursement.

'We are not a wealthy congregation. We are asking that the city reimburse Mr. Leo Church \$17,353 which is the cost of the ServePro cleanup. In this situation we had no choices. The insurance company contacted ServePro. ServePro came out and they started the work. We had no idea what the cost would be. Certainly, the cleanup had to be done but we didn't have any options or it appeared that we did not."

Pirtle requested permission to negotiate a settlement with the remediation company for the max amount the committee can spend without Board of Mayor and Aldermen approval, that being \$10,000, and it refund the church \$7,353.

Committee members unanimously approved.

Rock Island

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"If houses or subdivisions were built on these tracts, it would have severely impacted the viewshed and tranquility of the park setting, not to mention destruction of sensitive habitat which includes many threatening hemlock trees. TPGF, including several local supportive members, was instrumental in helping with both of these land protection projects. TPGF, in conjunction with the park, is currently fundraising to cover \$40,000 of outstanding costs incurred related to appraisals and processing.
