Sullens Transport keeps on truckin'

Sullens Transport employees are no stranger to hard work. They have stood the test of time, been in business 40 years, and have made their company successful

in many ways. Troy Sullens, 64, start-

> ed his business on July 4, 1978 and has skyrocketed from there. Before Troy started his business, he worked at Powermatic here in McMinnville. He was on the picket line for \$20 a day when Powermatic workers went on strike.

> With their young son Chris and bills coming in, Troy thought it was time to make a change.

Troy's wife Diane asked Troy if he knew anyone who would want to haul milk part time. Troy jumped right in, said he would take the position, and ran the milk route that same day. At night he would work at Powermatic.

Soon after, Troy was offered the opportunity to buy his own truck and he happily said yes thinking he would make a better living and evenportation business. When he first got started, Troy did all the work from his home.

His son, Chris, says, "I remember changing tires in the driveway. I used to never want to come home from school because I knew when I got home I would have to work for my dad."

For the first two years, Troy had two trucks. Now he runs 25. The business grew with much

speed when they bought out Hawkins Corporation in 1996 and then bought out Weaver Transport in 1997.

It was 13 years ago when they moved to their current location on Hennessee Avenue in Smartt Station.

Along the way, Sullens Transport has expanded its operation. Now, not a day passes that they don't pick up from a dairy farm and deliver the milk to plants all over the Southeast. Their deliveries are mainly food-grade products. In short, if they can put it in a bottle to drink, they transport it.

Besides their products, they make their own biodiesel and use an estimated 400,000 gallons a year. They also work on their own equipment and other equipment as well. There is nothing they don't do in-house and nothing is subcontracted out.

So how does a person develop a huge successful business from scratch? Troy says, "You have to out work your competition. Whatever you put into it, it's what you're going to get out of it. God has blessed us."

Chris talks about his father and says he is the hardest working man he knows. His family has figured Troy has maybe taken 30 vacation days in the 40-year span he has run the business.

Chris says, "Cows don't know when Christmas Day is," meaning every day is a working day for Sullens Transport.

Plans for the future are to take it day by day. They don't expect any changes in their work ethic. They say quality employees and the support of Warren County have kept them striving to do their best.
