Elliott earns victory

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Watkins Glen turned out to be an Elliott weekend. It was announced Saturday that Bill Elliott would be back in a NASCAR car when he takes the green flag for the Xfinity Series race at Road America. It will be the Hall of Famer's first major NASCAR race in six years. When the Monster Energy NASCAR Cup Series "Go Bowling at the Glen" was completed Sunday, Bill's son Chase Elliott had stolen his dad's thunder by winning his first Cup Series race in 99 Starts.

The younger Elliott's win was no fluke as he held off Martin Truex Jr. and Kyle Busch, two of the "big three" teams to get the win. Busch may have had the best car Sunday, but a malfunction with the nozzle of the fuel can prevented the crew from getting all the fuel into the car.

Having to come back in the pits again, Busch was in 31st place when the green flag flew with just 31 laps remaining in the race. Busch still managed to move through the field into third, but was too far behind Elliott and Truex to challenge for the win.


Aramburo set the tone early in the finals, belting a two-out, bases-clearing triple in the second inning to give her team a 5-1 lead.

Elliott's win gave Hendrick Motorsports its first win, and only the third win for Chevrolet.

Busch's third-place finish and Kevin Harvick's mediocre day means that Busch's points lead is now up to 70 points with four races remaining in the regular season. Truex, Kurt Busch and Clint Bowyer round out the top five.

Harvick, Truex Jr., Austin Dillon, Clint Bowyer, Kyle Busch, Joey Logano, Erik Jones and Chase Elliott are the eight race winners in 22 races of 2018.
