Neal questions legality in regard to code names

Project Debunk Code Names has begun. Alderman Mike Neal has requested legal counsel consideration on the

lawfulness of the city’s Tourism Development Board members using secret code names in order to keep projects hush-hush. “Counsel, I’ve got a question,” said Neal. “In regard to the Tourism Board speaking in code in their meetings. I want a legal opinion. Is that legal?” The request was made during Tuesday’s Board of Mayor and Aldermen meeting. Since TDB’s first meeting, members have been using project names such as Project Post and Project Blue in order to keep those endeavors hidden from the public. “Honestly, I don’t know what the legal basis would be,” said city attorney Tim Pirtle. “I’ve not researched the issue.”

Neal replied, “Will you research the issue and report back to this board?” Mayor Jimmy Haley, a standing member of the Tourism Development Board as city mayor, defended the use of code. “The Industrial Development Board uses it,” he said. Neal replied, “This is not the Industrial Development Board.” “It’s the same,” said Haley. Neal disagreed. “No, it’s not. The Tourism Development Board is an entity of this board. They should have to follow the same rules we follow.” A legal determination, said Pirtle, will be provided by the board’s next Regular Session on Aug. 28 at 7 p.m.

GENERAL SESSIONS

General Sessions Judge Bill Locke handed down the following sentences Aug. 14 during General Sessions trial court.

Jon Blankenship will serve 30 days of an 11-month, 29-day sentence for possession of methamphetamine. He was fined \$750 plus costs.

Mikel Lee Brady will serve 30 days an 11-29 sentences for assault. He was ordered to attend a batterer intervention program.

Gregory Guyton was ordered to serve 10 days of an 11-29 sentence for attempted assault and undergo drug and alcohol assessment. He was also fined \$100 for two counts of public intoxication.

Melissa Holsonback received a six-month probationary sentence for possession of schedule VI drugs. She was fined \$250 plus costs.

Jendee Lydia Howell will serve 48 hours for violation of probation.

Bobby Jaco received an 11-month, 29-day probationary sentence for unlawful carrying or possession of a weapon.

Ronnie Jaco was allowed to enter the second chance program for aggravated assault. He must undergo an alcohol and drug assessment and mental exam.

Corey Michael Kirby had his probation revoked for violation of probation.

Patricia Lackey was

allowed to enter the second chance program for domestic assault. She must have follow-ups with alcohol and drug assessment.

Melissa Ann McClure will serve 40 days for violation of probation and failure to appear.

Connie June Morton must perform 32 hours of public service work and had probation extended for six months for violation of probation.

Christopher Pack will serve 30 days of an 11-29 sentence for simple possession and was fined \$750.

Jason Michael Petre was allowed to enter the second chance program for aggravated domestic assault.

Joshua Tipton will serve the remainder of his sentence for violation of probation.

James Nathan Turner was ordered to serve 30 days for violation of probation.

Sam Landon Womack must enter the drug court program and serve the balance of his sentence in jail for simple possession and violation of probation.

Shelby Ann Yates had probation revoked for violation of probation.

Todd Cantrell will serve 30 days of an 11-29 sentence and undergo alcohol and drug assessment for possession of meth. He was fined \$750.
