Covenant to set sail for History Day competition at MTSU

The Titanic was the largest ship afloat at the time it entered service in 1912. But its sinking at sea during its maiden voyage also made for one of the deadliest maritime disasters in modern history.

It's for those reasons students at Covenant Academy have selected the Titanic as one of their topics for an upcoming History Day competition at MTSU. The theme of this year's competition is Triumph and Tragedy.

"It was the biggest ship of its time, but its size also contributed to its downfall," said Covenant student Vansh Patel.

Covenant is sending several teams to the History Day competition with other themes of Triumph and Tragedy being the atomic bomb, Amilia Earhart, and the USS Indianapolis.

"The Manhattan Project was a success because it led to the creation of the atomic bomb which ended World War II," said Covenant student Terry Hines. "But it was a tragedy because it resulted in a tremendous loss of life and

FINAL REIMBURSEMENT DEADLINE SEPT. 1: This is a firm deadline. TAEP will not be able to offer extensions of any kind this year due to the tight timeline between the reimbursement request deadline Sept. 1 and the start of the next application period

APPLICATION PERIOD OCT. 1-15: All



applications must be postmarked or submitted online during this period.

TAEP PRODUCER NUMBER MAILING: SEPT. 1: A letter will be mailed in September to producers who have applied for TAEP within the past three years. The letter will include dates for the upcoming application period and will feature the producer's TPN and TAEP

TAEP will provide UT a copy of the letter and a spreadsheet featuring producers' TPNs in September. The TPN is considered the producer's account number and is used when applying and corresponding with TAEP. The TAEP ID is used when initially accessing the TAEP Online

account system. **BQA RÉ-CERTIFICATION:** Applicants qualifying with cattle will be required to have a current BQA certification at time of application. Please continue to encourage producers to update their BQA certifications if needed prior to applying in October. If a producer's BQA is sched-

uled to expire Nov. 1, 2018, it is current for the 2018 application period. UT-TSU Extension will be offering two BQA classes Sept. 18 and Sept. 20 in the early voting room begin-

ning at 6 p.m. ADVANCED MASTER BEEF: In order to participate in the 2018-19 TAEP program at the 50 percent level, all persons must have completed the Advanced Master Program (beef or nursery) Jan. 1, 2015 or after. The Advanced Master Beef Class will be offered beginning in February for those who are needing the certification. The Advanced Master Nursery is only offered online at https://



SMALL RUMİNANT **CLASS OFFERED**: A Master Small Ruminant Producer Program will be held at the University of Tennessee Institute of Agriculture's Middle Tennessee AgResearch and Education Center from Oct. 10-12. The program is an excellent learning opportunity for sheep and goat producers with informational sessions on small ruminant production, management and marketing.

The program will feature a combination of classroom teaching and hands-on learning experiences. At the end of the three-day course, producers will receive their master producer certification and will be eligible to qualify for a 50-percent cost share from the Tennessee Agricultural Enhancement Program.
