

Weekend of crime



Two burglaries, a stolen motorcycle, a broken-into car and a drive-by shooting into a house all occured within a one-mile radius this weekend. Police encourage anyone with information to call 473-3386.

Drive-by shooting, burglaries, theft occur within mile radius

A home on Towles Avenue was the target of a drive-by shooting in the early morning hours Monday, capping a weekend crime spree that saw two business burglarized, a car broken into, and a motorcycle stolen.

The incidents all happened within a one-mile radius. Police believe the burglaries could be related, but think shooting into the home was an isolated incident.

'Generally if you're

breaking into places you and the office of accoundon't want to draw attention to yourself with a drive-by shooting," said McMinnville Police detective Todd Rowland. "We don't know if the house was picked at random or if it was specifically targeted. The homeowner said he's not aware of having any enemies."

The drive-by shooting took place at 1:30 a.m. Monday morning. Four 9 mm shell casings were recovered. There were no injuries.

The two businesses burglarized were Cash N Dash on Chancery Street tant Rufus Gonder on Center Street. Both breakins were discovered Monday morning when employees arrived for work.

At Cash N Dash, the thief or thieves gained entry by breaking in a back door. They escaped with a small amount of cash.

Access to Gonder's office was gained by breaking a back window. Rowland said thieves made off with \$20.

"They're not getting rich," said Rowland of the small amounts taken.

A motorcycle was stolen from a home on Walker Street, but it was found behind a vacant home on Center Street. Rowland says investigators believe the motorcycle was being hidden there temporarily until it could be moved.

Police say a wallet was taken from an unlocked car in the same area, but it was found on the ground nearby. There was reportedly no money in the wallet to steal.

Because of the location of the crimes, the person responsible could live in the area. Rowland said detectives are in the process of pulling surveillance footage and tracking down leads.


