Burglar caught in church

A Rock Island man wanted in connection with a string of burglaries that includes stealing 20 bottles of liquor from the VFW was taken into custody while breaking into a church.

Corey Michael Kirby, 33, was arrested inside Martin's Chapel Church and was reportedly found with meth at the time.

Kirby faces seven counts of burglary, seven counts of theft, one count of possession of meth, and violation of probation.

The largest burglary Kirby is accused of perpetrating was July 24 at the VFW where 20 bottles of liquor were stolen. Jack Daniels, Jim Beam, Seagram's, Captain Morgan and Bacardi were among the liquors taken. Also stolen was cash, two desktop computers, a leaf blower, and a blank VFW check.

At the bar, the thief unplugged all the security cameras. However, those efforts failed to conceal his identity.

"I can tell you we have identified a suspect," said Warren County Sheriff Jackie Matheny. "We're looking for him as we speak. He's lying low. Everywhere we thought he would be, he hasn't been."

Law enforcement caught up to Kirby at Martin's Chapel Church on Starlight Road. Kirby reportedly broke into the church July 26 in the morning and then returned later that same night, which investigators were expecting.

"When the investigators arrived, they found Corey Kirby inside the church and took Kirby into custody without incident," said investigator Travis Thaxton in his arrest warrant. "An eyeglass container was found near the window where Kirby entered and excited the building that contained four used syringes and a plastic bag that contained a crystal-like substance that field tested positive for methamphetamine."

Kirby reportedly stole a TV, two DVD players, blankets, and canned food from the church.

Kirby is also accused of burglarizing Midway Country Café on July 26, then walking across the road and burglarizing Midway CIC.

On July 19, he is charged with burglarizing a garage/ storage building at a home on Pine Bluff Road.


More than lip service
