TCAT receives \$10,000 grant

Tennessee College of Applied Technology has received a \$10,000 grant from the Gene Haas Foundation.

"This is my fourth grant in four years for a total of said \$50,000," **TCAT** instructor Randy England. "I'm fortunate to be able to write these grants. Every penny goes to help my students. I have two students right now who need tools, and just a basic set is \$925. Thanks to grants from the foundation, I can buy those for them. That helps them tremendously. Not all students receive financial aid. Some pay as they go and need help to do it.


England, instructor of the college's Machine Tool Technology program, prepares students for jobs as machinists, machine setup operators, and CNC operators. The course is designed to give the student experience on a variety of machine tools similar to those on which he/ she will work after graduation, including computerized numerical controlled machines. Instruction is given in related blueprint reading, mathematics, precision measuring, and basic metallurgy. In 1999, Gene Haas founded the Gene Haas Foundation. Haas is the owner of Haas Automation Inc., America's leading builder of CNC machine tools, which he started in
