### Barnes faces federal charges for making pills

A McMinnville man faces 14 years in prison after he was indicted on federal charges for producing and distributing counterfeit prescription medication.

Dylan Wesley Barnes has been hit with two federal charges -- conspiracy to distribute narcotics, and possession of a pill press. His first appearance in federal court in Chattanooga was Monday.

According to the federal grand jury indictment against Barnes, he was distributing alprazolam, a Schedule IV controlled substance. The drug is commonly known under the trade name Xanax and is used as

a mood relaxer to relieve anxiety.

The grand jury contends Barnes began possessing and distributing alprazolam in June 2016 and continued until January 2018.

June 2016 and continued until January 2018. It was on Jan. 9, 2018 when Barnes was reportedly found in possession of equipment to manufacture the pills.

"Dylan Wesley Barnes did knowingly and intentionally possess a punch, die, plate and other things designed to print, imprint and reproduce the trademark, trade name and other identifying mark and imprint of another, and any likeness of any of the foregoing, upon any drug so as to render such drug a counterfeit substance," the grand jury determined.

The drug making equipment reportedly had a die and plate to stamp tablets with "WATSON 853" with a center score on the other side

## Knowles retiring from jail supervisor post

When a new Warren County Sheriff is elected in August, one of his first responsibilities will be naming a new jail supervisor.

Eddie Knowles has announced he will be retiring in August.

"I'm leaving Aug. 31," said Knowles. "I'm getting ready to live life, I guess. I've been making decisions all my life and some pretty big decisions, but this was the hardest one I've ever made. When to retire is a tough decision to make. It wasn't easy."

Knowles began working as a corrections officer at the jail 16 years ago and became supervisor in 2005.

"It has been a challenge, that's for sure," said Knowles. "But, everybody says I have the easy job. I've got about 35 employees and about 300 inmates. That isn't much to take care of everyday, is it?"

Members of the county Budget and Finance Committee met Tuesday and expressed concern for a new sheriff giving someone Knowles' ending salary. There are six sheriff candidates: Billy Joe Crouch, Bobby Edwards, Marc Martin, John Morgan, Tommy Myers, and Rodney

"Some of the people running for sheriff already have their jail director picked, by what some of them have told me," said Commissioner Carl E. Bouldin. "We can't let them start out at \$48,313."
