Cumberland Caverns bills itself as Tennessee's largest show cave and it's a treat to explore. The attraction is located at the base of Harrison Ferry Mountain at 1437 Cumberland Caverns Road off Highway 8. The phone number is 668-4396. Cumberland Caverns will be celebrating its 62nd birthday this year. Fortunately, the cave isn't showing its age. Its crevices and underworld offerings are as inviting as ever.

Rain or shine, hot or cold, Cumberland Caverns is open year-round for educational walking tours that plummet visi-

tors below the earth's surface. The cave stays at a constant temperature of 56 degrees.

Cumberland Caverns offers educational field trips, overnight spelunking trips, daytime adventure trips, group tours, and banquets, birthday parties, and weddings. It's gaining a reputation as a first-rate concert venue, which may be one reason the cave attracted more than 60,000 visitors in 2017.

The caves at Cumberland Caverns display some of the largest underground rooms and most spectacular formations in America. Visitors relive history as they view historic salt peter mining artifacts and incredible formations.

The walking tour has been described as a spectacular 1.5-mile adventure. Visitors view a beautiful waterfall and gleaming pools. The natural beauty of large rooms and unique formations also amaze.

The underground ballroom features a unique and beautiful 3/4-ton crystal chandelier. The chandelier was originally installed in 1928 in the Loews Metropolitan Theatre in Brooklyn, N.Y.
