
Senior Wildcats ...

Wildcats wants to see that standard be the norm once again. King says the attitudes and effort have been very good and he is excited about what he is seeing from the GCHS student athletes.

"Eighty-plus kids turned out for every session we had this summer - 8 a.m., three days a week," King said. "This county is so spread out and all of our players don't have vehicles, so for us to have that many players to make it a priority to get here and be a part of that makes us feel really proud."

"We got a lot of work in this summer, both in the weight room and on the field. And, I expect that to make a difference. It's a big deal to be able to get guys stronger and build confidence."

Despite all that, the 2018 season could not have gotten off to a much worse start. After scoring on a 61-yard run on the very first play from scrimmage Friday night at Collinsville, things started going down hill for GCHS. They lost one of their top players to injury in the first quarter and never got their offense back in gear. The end result was a 25-14 loss to West Lauderdale and a lot of questions moving forward.

"We had a couple of plays were the difference in the game," King said. "And, when we lost Garrett (West), with all he does for our offense, we just didn't have an answer for getting any consistency on that side of the ball."

"It was a tough loss, but there were some bright spots. The players never quit, they kept playing hard. We just have to regroup, and depending on what we find out on Garrett, take a good look at who we are as a team and get ready for the next challenge."


That next challenge comes this Friday when the Cats travel
