Cats wants to take next step toward being a championship program in Ricks' second year

s a former standout at the school and the son of the coach whose name is literally stamped on the court, Greene County head men's basketball coach Phillip Ricks faced some high expectations in his first season leading the program last year. Ricks and his team answered those expectations by producing the school's first winning season in several years.

Ricks' inaugural team posted a 15-13 overall record, claimed the Perry Central Invitational Tournament title in the regular season and advanced to the MHSAA playoffs. Ricks did that with a group of players that were unfamiliar with his system, while he learned on the go what their individual strengths and weaknesses were and how they best fit into that system. This year is setting up to be different and Ricks feels confident the results in his second year to compete in the Richton Rotary Tournament.

"I really believe we will be a solid team with really good teamwork. We have a lot of experience on the roster and have a lot of flexibility and can operate in a lot of different offenses sets. With that said, I think we will be very competitive and we believe we can compete for a region championship and a playoff spot."

To do that, Ricks will have to find a way to replace a lot of production lost to graduation in May. And, as the season gets into full swing this week, the Cats have just one returning starter and six total returning varsity players with which to do that.

"We lost some good players, but every team is different andI like what I see," Ricks said. "We've had a year together and I understand our players and think they understand what is expected."

Kimble's team eyeing return to playoffs as coach seeks 600th win

The GCHS Lady Wildcats had a great season a year ago, finishing 20-10 on the year and making it to the MHSAA Playoffs for the third year in a row.

Coach Dale Kimble's squad finished the 2017-2018 campaign in second place in Region 7-4A thanks in large part to a big, experienced senior class. Those six seniors accounted for 60 percent of the Lady Cats' scoring and over 50 percent of the team's rebounding. That is a lot of production to replace, but Kimble believes the players he has on this year's roster, including three seniors, has the experience and ability to do that, and maybe more.

"We aren't where we need to be yet, but as the season progresses, I believe this group has a chance to be pretty solid," the veteran coach said. "We have a big roster with really good depth. When we sub players in we really don't lose much in terms of production."

"We have the ability and put a lot of focus on being a really good defensively. We play manto-man defense most of the time and I like the way our players get after people. Offensively, we have experimented with some new sets and are trying to be more of a transition team, running the floor and being aggressive going to the basket."

Kimble doesn't have the same luxury this year in terms of seniors as his squad has just three on the roster, including one that did not play as a junior. But, he does have a big junior class and a lot of players with varsity experience returning and the mix seems to be working well.

"I really like our team chemistry," Kimble said. "These girls really seem to enjoy being around each other and do a good job of holding each other accountable, but doing it in the right way, without being negative."

"I give the seniors a lot of credit in that regard. They have led by example with their work ethic and just really good attitudes."
