# Spotlight on Health

## **Laurens County** doctors getting a foothold on underserved population

Upstate Podiatry Group now has its foot in the door in Laurens County. Its Laurens office, which opened in early March, at 1073 Medical Ridge **Road** provides foot care for a local population its doctors say has been underserved.

"It's about accessibility for the public," said Upstate Podiatry's Dr. William Long, an upstate native who returned to open the Simpsonville-based practice in 2013. "There's a huge need because there's a large diabetic population, but we love Dr. Katherine Heugel and Dr. William Long healing patients whatever the problem might be."

Dr. Long recently brought Dr. Katherine Heugel into the practice. Both of the doctors graduated from the Temple University School of Podiatric Medicine and completed their residencies at the University of Pennsylvania Presbyterian Medical Center in Philadelphia.

Now, they are the only two four-year residency-trained podiatrists currently practicing in the upstate of South Carolina.

"We have a wide variety of surgeries we can perform, and we just love helping people," Long said. We're happy to be here."

Long was a fourth-year resident at Penn when Heugel arrived for her first year of residency. They worked together there and stayed in touch even after Long returned home to the Upstate.

"When I found out Dr. Long was looking for an associate, I was excited because we worked well together." Heugel said. "South Carolina has an under-representation of podiatry, so to come into an area that needs good foot care was important to me, too."


"We have a lot of hard-working people, and your feet can hurt, especially after 12 hours on concrete. If we can try to help you with that, then please allow us to assist.'

Long said he has been impressed with Heugel's skills as a podiatrist as well as her "bedside manner" with patients. Their common background at Temple and Penn helps with their communication now.

"Knowing that she's coming from the same pedigree that I came from, I know that we can bounce things off one another," Long said. "We bounce things off one another all the time, especially dealing with patients here at the Wound Care Center in Laurens. At the end of the day, we get the goal of healing the patient. ... We're a team.'

"What can we do to help you get well?" Heugel continued.

Long and Heugel are currently rotating at Upstate Podiatry's Laurens office. The office is open Mondays from 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m., Wednesdays from 1:30 p.m.-5 p.m. and Fridays from 8:30 a.m.-noon.
