Lawn mower racing coming to **Gray Court's Creekside Speedway**

Gentlemen, start your mowers.

That's exactly what is set to take place Sunday, April 29, at the new Creekside Speedway on S.C. Highway 101 in Gray Court. The eighth-mile oval will host lawn mower racing each week, a first for Laurens County and possibly the state.

"We want everyone to come out and participate," said Creekside owner Scott Campbell, who is opening the track with girlfriend Luwana Burnett.

The green flag on the inaugural race day is scheduled to drop at 2 p.m., and racing will be done by 5 p.m. The track will host five divisions - Kids, Women, Stock, Super Stock and Modified — each Sunday with the season set to run into October.

"It's a lot cheaper than building a race car," said Burnett, who, along with Campbell, is part of the local auto-racing community. Son-in-law Michael Smith is a regular competitor at Laurens County Speedway.

Campbell said lawnmower racers could get into the sport for \$200 or less. Mowers require some modifications for safety, but can be put on the track pretty much as is in the stock divi-

Second trial in VFW murder to start Monday

The man accused of killing Laurens resident James Bolt in 2003 at the local Veterans of

Foreign Wars building is expected come to trial Monday.

Arthur "A.J." Bowers charged with murder in the nearly 15-year-old case that shocked the local commu-

nity because of its brutality. Prosecutors aim to prove that Bowers, now 32, entered the VFW building around closing time and bludgeoned Bolt to death on Sept. 26, 2003.

Although the case was never closed by the Laurens Police Department, it remained cold until the LPD and investigators from the 8th Circuit Solicitor's Office uncovered new evidence. Bowers was (Continued on page 3)
