Up and running

New Saxon Station on Thompson Road setting new path in county

Laurens County's newest fire station is open for business.

The "Saxon Station" on Thompson Road in the Fountain Inn countryside officially opened on July 1, staffed around the clock with two professional firefighters crosstrained as emergency-medical technicians

"This is the first step of a proactive outlook for the county," said Laurens County Fire Services Deputy Director Kurt Thackston.

The Saxon Station, which is named after a member of the family that sold the county the land where the station now sits, has been described as a "pilot program" that could be time firefighter-EMTs to staff the department along with volunteers.

Laurens County Fire Services Director Greg Lindley outlined the program to county council at a November meeting, saying the cost of staffing the new facility would be about \$220,000 annually. That expense is covered with savings from a now-canceled fire-services contract with the Fountain Inn Fire Department.

"This is the first time we've ever required our firemen to be EMT certified," Thackston said. "That's a big step for us. We've got seven or eight people in EMT school right now."

Piedmont Technical School's EMT program is helping to train EMTs vital to the county's emergency system, Thackston said.

Firefighter William Rice, who was working his 24-hour shift at the new station Wednesday afternoon, is among those seekimplemented in stations across the county if it ing EMT certification. EMT trainees undergo is successful. The program calls for six full- 220 hours of training in order to be certified.

Russian's last day on the job in Laurens County will be Wednesday, but he said he expects to be checking in from time to time to "tie up some loose ends."
