Tuesday

Northwood 10, Laurens 1: The hopes of an undefeated run through the state tournament for Laurens came to an end in Tuesday's championship bracket final as Northwood pitcher Jack Zadel went five 5 1/3 innings to earn the victory,

Zadel, who did not give up a hit until a two-out single to Auston Williams in the bottom of the fourth inning, allowed just four hits and one run. Zadel also struck out six batters without allowing a walk.

Northwood, facing Laurens pitcher Ryland Paxton, won by chipping away at its opponent. After a scoreless first inning Northwood came back with a single run in the second, then two more in the third, one in the fourth, and two in the fifth - before delivering the finishing touch with a four-run sixth

Paxton, who went one batter into the fifth inning, was left taking the loss. He gave up four runs on five hits and five walks, striking out one before being lifted after giving up a lead-off single in the fifth. That runner did not score.

Laurens' offense, mean-while, could never get into full gear against Zadel. After Zadel struck out the side in the first, with only Luke Young reaching on an error with two out. Laurens did not get a runner to second safely in the second inning before being retired in order in the third, and after Williams' single with two out in the fourth, Northwood got out of any slight trouble when Laurens' Braden Yarbrough struck out swinging to end the inning.

Laurens, with two out in the fifth, finally saw the bats come to life. Wyatt Pinson had an infield hit to short, followed by a Brayden Patterson infield hit to put runners on first and second before Dee Suber, on the first pitch he saw, singled to right-center to allow Pinson to score after the Northwood catcher dropped the throw to the plate. Had the catcher held on to the throw, Pinson would've been out.

But Northwood erased any lingering hope of a comeback in the sixth when it scored its final four runs, and Laurens went down with just a Williams single to account for the team's final hit of the game. Williams finished the game 2 for 3.

Wednesday

Laurens 4, Greenville 2: Laurens had to sweat it out a little bit as Greenville put the potential go-ahead run at the plate in the bottom of the fifth, then had the potential tying run at the plate in the sixth inning, before the host squad held on to stay in the tournament.

IRS, Security Summit Partners warn of scam twist

The Internal Revenue Service recently inals claim to be calling from a local IRS TAC number, the fraudsters resume their demands criminals use telephone numbers that mimic computers to display the TAC telephone num-IRS Taxpayer Assistance Centers (TACs) to trick taxpayers into paying non-existent tax

The IRS and its Security Summit partners the state tax agencies and the tax industry urge taxpayers to remain alert to tax scams yearround, especially immediately after the tax filing season ends. Even after the April deadline passes, the tax scam season doesn't end.


In the latest version of the phone scam, crim-

warned of a new twist on an old phone scam as office. Scam artists have programmed their ber, which appears on the taxpayer's Caller ID when the call is made.

If the taxpayer questions their demand for tax payment, they direct the taxpayer to IRS.gov to look up the local TAC office telephone number to verify the phone number. The crooks hang up, wait a short time and then call back a second time, and they are able to fake or "spoof" the Caller ID to appear to be the IRS office calling. After the taxpayer has "verified" the call for money, generally demanding payment on a debit card.

Fraudsters also have been similarly spoofing local sheriff's offices, state Department of Motor Vehicles, federal agencies and others to convince taxpayers the call is legitimate.

IRS employees at TAC offices do not make calls to taxpayers to demand payment of overdue tax bills. The IRS reminds taxpayers it typically initiates most contacts through regular mail delivered by the United States Postal


