## Holmes County Black History

#### A Profile on Walter C. Crosby

In 1972, Walter Crosby was one of three Afro - Americans including Richard O. Williams and Lewis Younger, who successfully completed academy coursework and training and was commissioned for the Mississippi Highway Patrol. The historical significance of this achievement was a landmark event in the history of the Mississippi Highway Patrol and in the History of the State of Mississippi. Publications around the country reported on this historic milestone in history including JET Magazine.

Walter Crosby has received many accommodations from Local, State, and National Organizations for his efforts in blazing a trail for aspiring law enforcement officers. He was the first Afro American to pass the State Highway Patrol Exam. He worked hard to not only protect our public highways but also served on security detail for high ranking State Elected Officials as well as many college basketball

Walter Crosby served in several Counties including Holmes County by working through the MS Highway Patrol -Troop D out of Greenwood, MS. He served as a State Trooper in Holmes County for over half of his career. He worked closely with all of the local law enforcement agencies

throughout the County. In addition, he supported the local school district with public safety support for games and special events. In 2012, the Mississippi State Legislature, recognized and commemorated the 40th Anniversary of the First African Americans Sworn Troopers in the Mississippi Highway Patrol. We are proud of his accomplishments and pause to recognize his place in Black History as well as Mississippi History.
