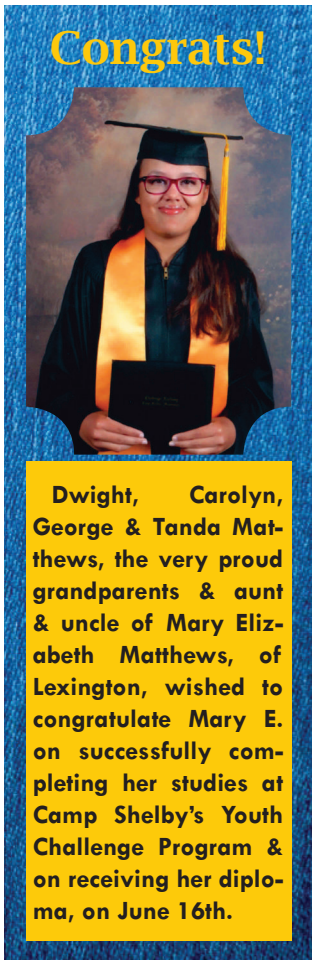
### President's List
