Deltech to source electricity from Durant after Aug. 29th meeting

Durant, county and Deltech company heads reached an agreement during an Au- tech CEO Robert Elefante) gust 29 executive session and the meeting didn't take

to source its electricity from the city of Durant.

"We did meet with (Delten minutes," said Durant Mayor Henry Robinson. "We had all come to the decision that they would be coming in to offer jobs and they would be using the city of Durant's electricity."

Deltech will be paying Durant for its use of electricity that is routed through the nearby Durant sub-station. The same electrical connection used by prior tenants would be utilized, according to Robinson.

"We are actually providing security for them until everything is up and running," said Robinson.

A deadline has not been set on the facility's total rehabilitation and repairs.

"We were told they'd get back with us in a few weeks, but that they were moving on (with repairs)," said Robinson. "I do plan on speaking
