

Always Clumsy

Once again, I am wearing a new piece of attire, another ankle/foot boot. This one is the shortest of the three I have worn for an injury so far. The first one was from foot to knee and that was healing a broken leg/ankle, the next one was for a broken foot, underneath on my arthritis line, and now and hopefully the last one ever, is a short soft one that just goes to the bottom part of my ankle and over my foot. No bones broken this time, but ligaments and tendons torn. This injury was no less bizarre than any of the other two, maybe just a little more. This particular damage was, of course another accident. Our bed is a huge Teester bed, built into the floor and

into the high ceiling. It is about four feet off the floor and totally impossible for my five-foot frame to get on without some type of assistance. My brother, being the fine carpenter, he is, built me a three-foot-long and twelve inches tall "box" to climb on and to reach my elevated mattress. It has been very effective for a long time now but after getting up in the night and going back to my bed, half asleep, I missed the entire little box and it turned over and I hit the floor with it laying on top of me. The commotion I made as I fell, roused my husband from his sleep and as he ran around to my side he thought I had fallen off the bed and was extremely

anxious and disturbed that I probably had broken another bone. I was able to stand and get to a chair, but the pain was extreme. After using a walker for two days, I did go see my doctor and here I am in the boot once again. The first time I broke a bone, I was coming down from our third floor and sat down on my right foot as I fell and came down several stairs. I had to "bump" down the stairs the rest of the steps to get to the stretcher as the ambulance arrived. The next bone broken was my right shoulder as I tripped over a pile of fire wood laying just outside our back door. This time I had shoulder replacement and wore a sling for a while. Moving on, the next time was my right shoulder/arm as I slipped in spilled bacon grease and broke this arm. As I walked into the waiting room at Sports Medicine, the people asked, "Who brought the biscuits and bacon?" I just raised my good hand. Again, I wore a sling on this arm. A few years later I fell in the doctor's office and fractured my foot bone on my arthritis line, shorter boot this time. Then there was the toe a few months ago. I took care of that with some duct tape. Now from this last fall, I am wearing a short little boot to help the ligaments heal.

The last time we flew on an airplane, I had to have a doctor's written letter stating that I had stainless steel in both my arms as I set off the bells and alarms going

AG Hood, others reach \$148M settlement over uber's data breach

Popular ride-sharing company Uber will pay Mississippi \$716,861.15 after reaching a settlement with each state totaling \$148 million over its 2016 data breach, announced Attorney General Jim Hood.

The California-based company, Uber Technologies, Inc. failed to address a data breach to its affected drivers for an entire year after becoming aware of the incident. Uber learned in November 2016 that hackers had gained access to some personal information that Uber maintains about its drivers, including drivers' license information of approximately 600,000 drivers nationwide, and 1,230 drivers here in Mississippi. The company was able to identify the hackers and obtained assurances that the hackers deleted the information. However, the breach triggered Mississippi data breach notification requirements, and Uber failed to report the breach until a year later.

"This settlement should send a message to hacked companies that it is in their best interest to notify impacted Mississippians according to state law," General Hood warned.

As part of the settlement, Uber has agreed in detail to strengthen its corporate governance and data security practices to help prevent a similar occurrence in the future. The settlement is subject to court approval.

The settlement between Mississippi and Uber requires the company to:

- Comply with Mississippi data breach and consumer protection law regarding pro-

tecting Mississippi residents' personal information and notifying them in the event of a data breach concerning their personal information;

- Take precautions to protect any user data Uber stores on third-party platforms outside of Uber;
- Use strong password policies for its employees to gain access to the Uber network;
- Develop and implement a strong overall data security policy for all data that Uber collects about its users, including assessing potential risks to the security of the data and implementing any additional security measures beyond what Uber is doing to protect the data;
- Hire an outside qualified party to assess Uber's data security efforts on a regular basis and draft a report with any recommended security improvements. Uber will implement any such security improvement recommendations; and
- Develop and implement a corporate integrity program to ensure that Uber employees can bring any ethics concerns they have about any other Uber employees to the company, and that it will be heard. Additionally, a private class action is being litigated in California to address individual monetary claims, which is separate from this settlement.


RANCH CHICKEN CHEESE DIP
