Johnson carries load in Tide's first win

Edgerton quarterback Jaden Johnson is the definition of a dual threat. After throwing for four touchdowns and collecting 365 yards last week against McFarland, Johnson rushed for three fourth-quarter touchdowns this week as the Edgerton High School football team defeated rival Evansville 25-12 Friday in a

Rock Valley road game. "I thought he rose to the occasion, but I thought the key was the job our offensive line was doing," head coach Mike Gregory said.

Thanks to the offense line, which includes senior tackle Jordan Lietz, senior guard Cesar Ochoa, junior guard Ben Wileman, junior tackle Reed Farrington and senior center Trevor Evans, Johnson ran for touchdowns of 26, 34 and 66 yards in the final quarter of the game, en route to the senior quarterback recording 271 rushing yards for the day.

Edgerton (1-1) will host undefeated Brodhead/Juda Friday, as the Tide look to keep their groove going. Brodhead/Juda triumphed team's season openers this

Along with Johnson's 271 running yards, he also threw for 138 yards.

Junior Devin Jorgenson recorded 158 yards in his season debut. Senior tackle/ defensive end Jordan Lietz also made his debut.

The Tide will look to avenge last year's 51-20 loss to Brodhead/Juda this week.

a 46. It looked like it was going to be a disaster day for Suhr after she triple-bogeyed the first two holes and then double-bogeyed the third hole. But, the senior stayed composed and ended the day with a birdie and a par on the eighth and ninth holes.
