EHS to open aquaponics center this fall

An aquaponics center at Edgerton High School is expected to be up and running sometime by the start of the new year, with science teacher Tony DeWar heading the operation.

Aquaponics mixes aquaculture, which is the raising of animals in water, with hydroponics, which is the growing of plants in a soilless based system.

The animals provide nutrients for the plants in the form of waste, which helps the plants go through life processes.

The object of the aquaponics center is to produce leafy greens that can be used as lettuce, which would be sold potentially to the school's cafeteria and some of the local grocery stores.

DeWar noted that the greens would be all natural, without pesticides or herbicides.

"The biggest thing about aquaponics is you can grow plants throughout the entire year," DeWar said. "There is no such thing as a growing season. We have controlled conditions for the growing of the plants, and for the fish.'

Junior and senior students at the school can work on the aquaponics system by signing up for the Principles of Aquaponics class. There will be one class available in the fall, as well as the spring. Students will learn about the prinhistory ciples and aquaponics, as well as getting hands on experience running the aquaponics center.

The first semester class will be tasked with getting equipment set up in the greenhouse, putting in the plumbing system and testing things out.

DeWar said it would be a goal for his first semester students to get running water and fish stocked.

DeWar noted that keeping the aquaponics center in good shape will be an everyday task.

"Everyone is really excited about it," DeWar said.


