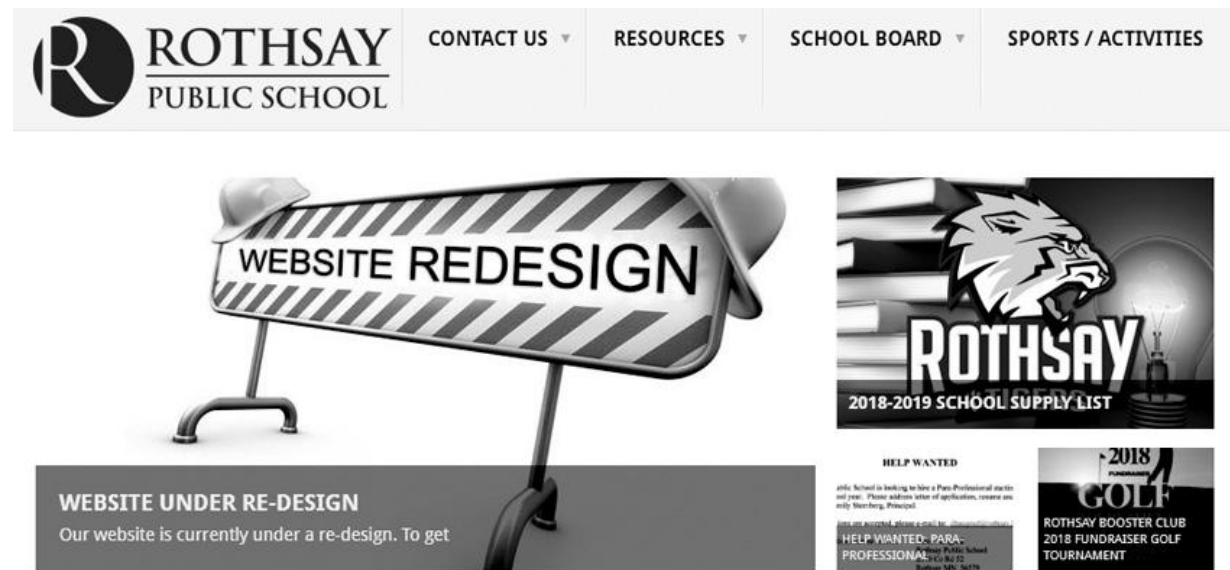


New Website Coming To The Rothsay School
