Carnival Company Free Acts on Main Street, and Big Parade and Horse Show

Buy your provisions Saturday for a two-day holiday as next Monday is Labor Day, when Hoisington will be the center of attraction for this part of the state. Better provide some eats for Labor Day, as the eating houses will be unable to cope with the crowd that attends Hoisington's Labor Day Programs.

Central States Carnival Co, will be here with a variety of attractions in the way of rides, shows, acts, contests, etc., They will be ready to entertain the public any and

all hours of the day. At 1:30 p.m., the big parade starts and by the way, the committee has Coca Cola tickets for those who take part in the parade and red and blue ribbons for the prize winners besides the other prizes.

The parade will terminate in the high school athletic field where the horse show will be staged for men and women riders in different gaits, cowboy, cowgirl, oldest and youngest rider, trick horse, best driving horse, draft team, colts, stallions, etc. and the horse show will be interspersed

with band numbers. Then there will be the potato race, stake race, egg race, roping from horse, roping from ground, etc.

There will be free shows on Main street afternoon and evening, featuring Claude Enslow with his entertaining magic, the Flying Mc-Brides on Roller Skates and Nelson Thomas in a hand Balancing Act. The Great Bend Air base band will help provide music.


