The groom's father served as his best man. His groomsmen were Jamie Spaulding and Jerry Scott, both of Troy.


The couple are the parents of Michael Tyler Scott and Samantha Nicole Scott, both of Troy.

Mrs. Mosley is the daughter of Johnnie Wall of Union City and the late Margaret (Kaufman) Wall.


Mosley is the son of June (Gaddie) Mosley of Hickman, Ky., and the late Eddie Mosley.
