The second business of customizing cars and trucks came from Bobby's passion and before the craze of lifting and loading trucks with big wheels and accessories had taken its hold in Obion County.

"Bobby would have to go to Kentucky to put on the wheels and tires to get the look he wanted for his own truck," explained Beverly. "So he told us we should do it ourselves."

"Everybody saw what we were doing, and they wanted it, too," added Brian.

"It became a business nobody saw coming," Beverly concluded.

Since 2005 that business has been going so strong that between running it and the car lot, Brian hasn't had a vacation in five years and admits to 14-hour days and having yet to celebrate his recent 11th wedding anniversary.

The success of Midway Motors keeps Brian on the road to auctions and Xtreme Customs' parade of trucks ready for the right touch ensures late nights in the office. But no matter where he is, Brian need only look down to see big brother Bobby's smile.
