Soybeans are much more than soy sauce and tofu, and a new exhibit at this year's Tennessee Soybean Festival might hold some surprises for visitors.

"All Things Soybean" is the theme for an old-fashioned general store opening in downtown Martin just for the festival.

Housed in a specially-designed building provided by a Martin native, the store will sit on the parking lot at the corner of University and Lindell, behind the police station.

"The concept is to let people know of everything made of soybeans that they use every day and don't know about," says Lynn Harper, who came up with the idea. He partnered with Joel Griffith, the



owner of the The Barnyard in Clarksville, to come up with a building that hearkens back to olden days, complete with a front porch on which to relax.

house displays of items made from soybeans, ranging from M&M candies to hand lotions and candles.

"Come to the store to see more," Harper advises. Soybean products can be found in plywood, crayons, ink, margarine, carpet and hydraulic fluid.

her original art and her
historical book, "Est
1873: An Illustrated History of Martin, Tenn." The
purpose of the project is
to preserve local history
through creating visual
pieces centered on landmarks, businesses and
events.

Plans are to offer souvenirs of the festival, as well as "a few other surprises," Harper predicts.

The store will also serve as an information center for anyone visiting the festival.
