Contestants must agree to clear their calendars to the extent that they will be able to carry out Miss Fall Fest duties and, if they move on to Miss Tennessee and then Miss America competition, to make time for those responsibilities, as well.

Tickets to view the pageant and support a favorite contestant will be \$10 at the door.

"This event allows young women to compete for scholarship money and a chance to move on to the Miss Tennessee Pageant for even more monetary support for their educations," says Mrs. Vincent, who adds that she always looks forward to meeting the new girls who have decided to compete locally on the way to achieving their goals.
