Is there any hope?

Psalm 137:1-2, “By the rivers of Babylon, there we sat down, yea, we wept when we remembered Zion. We hung our harps upon the willows in the midst of it.”

These are the words of people who had lost all hope. They were God’s people who, because of disobedience and an unwillingness to follow Him, now found themselves carried away captive and exiled into the land of their enemies. As they remembered Jerusalem and how good they had it back then, they now sat down to weep. They couldn’t imagine that it had come to this. They are now captives in shackles and chains who have been taken from the land of God’s blessings to the wasteland of despair in enemy territory. Songs were the one thing they had left to give them hope, but now, they couldn’t even sing. They were grieved and heartbroken, so they hung their harps on the weeping willows and sat down hopeless.

I would imagine we have all had times like this. Times when there seems to be no hope. When we look around at how bad things have become and we remember better days. Times when we scratch our heads and wonder, “How could it ever have come to this?” We ask ourselves, “How did I let myself get so far from home, from what’s good, from what’s right, ... from God?” The Israelites pondered those same questions themselves. “We had it so good when we obeyed the voice of the Lord; now look at us. What were we thinking by neglecting His Truth? We have played the fool in departing from the Lord.”

Based on what we see today, there are many people who are living right there. I just nailed their address. Young men and women, and older ones too, who can remember a time of life when they were being led in the right direction. Days when Mama and Daddy and Grandma and Grandpa or that neighbor or friend or relative made sure they were in Church and seeking righteousness. They used to sing the songs of Zion that gave them hope. Songs about the love of the Lord, the blood of Jesus, the hope of Heaven and songs of faith. But, like the Israelites, they’ve allowed the enemy to wrap them in chains and shackles of addiction, drugs, alcohol, adultery, fornication, idolatry, lust, hate, prejudice, selfishness, godlessness, cruelty and wickedness. They don’t even resist anymore; they have given up and sat down by the river and hung their harps on the willows.

It makes me sad and angry at the same time to hear of so many suicides, drug overdoses and needless deaths in McCormick County. Can we not see that the enemy of our souls is dealing in death? What can be the cause of the kind of despair, depression and discouragement that leads to this? I believe it has a great deal to do with “hopelessness.” Like the Israelites, many people feel there is nowhere else to turn; they can’t go any further. If you’re one of those folks in captivity and at the end of your road, I have great news for you: There is a turn you have overlooked.

You can turn to the Lord. Over and over again, God calls us to turn to Him. Many times, He gives the invitation to “Come, and come just as you are.” He will take you because He loves you. He offers grace to sinners like us. Lives are being changed every day and all around the world by God’s power and grace. I am seeing Him at work right here in McCormick County. Do you need to let Him work in your life? In coming to Him, He offers us hope, peace, rest, joy, purpose, freedom, security and His love.

Your enemy can’t do that. Neither can your dealer; your beer, wine and liquor man; or your man or woman on the side. They’re offering death and destruction, imprisonment, fear, depression, hurt, sorrow, pain and suffering, which all lead to hopelessness.

As you sit there in your tears and regrets and your grief and pain, while you remember the God of your youth, why don’t you call out to the Lord for your deliverance? There is hope; in fact, as long as there is God, there will be hope. He’s eternal, so there will always be hope. Unless you wait too long and pass up the opportunities He gives you to be rescued.

Authentic prayer

Matthew 6:5-8 – “And when you pray, do not be like the hypocrites, for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and on the street corners to be seen by men. I tell you the truth; they have received their reward in full. But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you. And when you pray, do not keep on babbling like pagans, for they think they will be heard because of their many words. Do not be like them, for your Father knows what you need before you ask Him.”

You don’t have to be a believer to pray. Crisis hits somebody’s life, and during their normal life, they might not even tip their hat to God or give God the time of day, but boy, crisis hits and they hit that “Spiritual 911” button. “Oh God, help me!” Or, some people seem to begin to pray but never finish – “Jee-sus Christ.”

You don’t have to be a believer to pray; everyone prays. Jesus assumes that. He doesn’t say, “if you pray.” He says, “when you pray.” But, the issue is not prayer; the issue is whether your prayers and my prayers are authentic or not. So, Jesus goes on to contrast authentic prayer with hypocritical and pagan prayers. He does that by giving you and me some “do’s” and “don’ts” about prayer.

Back in Jesus’ day, there were all kinds of folks who would struggle to see who could get furthest up in the synagogue and stand and pray in front of everyone. In fact, these folks were such powerful, pious people of prayer that they couldn’t even wait to get to church. I mean, on the way to church they would stop at nearly every street corner and begin to pray out loud. “Wow, look at Joe. He’s so spiritual! What a man of God!”

The only problem is Joe wasn’t really praying, at least not authentically. You see, Joe’s chief thing was not to pray, it was to be seen. Joe was putting on spiritual airs. He wanted to be known as a spiritual giant. But, he’s not. He’s not really praying at all – Joe is performing.

God says, “Don’t be like those babbling pagans who just go on

and on and on.” Again, the issue is they are trying to impress God with their many words. Trying to impress God? As if you and I can impress God. Prayer is simply conversation with God. Talking with Him, opening your life up and inviting Him into your life.

Put yourself in God’s shoes for just a moment. Imagine if you are God, and every day you’ve got millions of authentic and inauthentic prayers flying at you all the time. The only thing I can figure is it must be like the difference between getting a phone call from a telemarketer versus a phone call from your best friend. One’s trying to manipulate you, one’s trying to get something from you, one’s trying to impress you, one’s trying to get you to do something, one’s trying to twist your arm, one’s trying to meet a sales quota, one’s trying to impress some bosses and one is simply about relationships.

Prayer is at the heart of a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. We are committed to the realization that God answers prayer in His way and in His time because He is sovereign. God can’t be manipulated. Prayer is not some kind of arm wrestling match with God trying to get a reluctant God to do something for us. God always answers prayer, always answers out of His grace, always out of His love, always out of what He believes to be best for your life and for mine down there at the bottom of His heart. Maybe we can’t see it, but we have to trust it. He always answers, either yes, or no, or wait.

That’s what authentic prayer is all about. It’s letting your heart break open and maybe even bleed before the Lord for certain people and situations. Stop making your prayer sound like you’re reading from a short novel – far more has been produced by a short authentic prayer than you and I can ever imagine in our wildest dreams.

Be authentic – not a performer!
