## City of Arthur to borrow from IEPA revolving fund to pay for water system updates and improvements

Arthur Board met in regular session on Monday, July 2, at Arthur Municipal Building. The meeting was called to order at 7 p.m. Trustees Bernius, Justin Ray, Paul Pearce, Jenni Marner, and Dave Tiffan. Mike Hilgenberg was absent.

It was a short agenda with most of the meeting dealing with a review of the big Freedom Celebration hosted by the village just two days before on Saturday, June 30.

The expenditure report, with expenses totaling \$44,966.86, was reviewed and unanimously approved as presented.


