The event was not purely just for fun either. Best's close friend and co-owner of the cattle company in California suffers from PTSD. Best wished to use this to raise awareness about the issue.

"My friend was supposed to be here, but he was having some struggles and had to check in for outpatient treatment. He is impacted everyday by PTSD but knows when and where to seek help. There are so many people who have put their lives on the line in serving our country that are just like him. We need to find ways to support them!"


