As a reporter and photographer, I have been able to attend areas of the competition that most people cannot—and that is to be in the room while the judges are actually sampling and rating the entries.

Judges are regular people like you and me. Mostly retirees, some were educators, law enforcement officials, businessmen and business women, accountants, farmers, and many others.

Some travel miles and miles to serve at competitions—so many miles that judging could be considered a second (or third) occupation.

County clerk warns residents of telephone voter registration scam in Douglas County

General draws near, Douglas County Clerk Judi Pollock reminds voters that Early Voting and Voter Registration is available in her office.

In addition, Pollock recently received information that some area residents have reported receiving phone calls impersonating an organization that provides voter registration assistance and mentioning various clerks and their offices by name.

There have been reports that these events are occurring in other election jurisdictions. The callers ask the a phone call to report it to es all residents to be vigilant
