There has been a flurry of business activity on Main Street in Villa Grove recently. Main Street Treasures is settling into their new facility in the old Collom Shoe Store location. Sam Laws has purchased the old Slender You location for an as yet undisclosed purpose, and Picture It Sold, which specializes in online consignment sales and other services, has opened its doors in the space formerly occupied by MST. I recently caught up with Jamie of Picture It Sold to learn more about the latest venture to come to Villa Grove.

1. What is the name of your new venture?

The name of the store is Picture It Sold, my son actually came up with the name after days of brainstorming! The reason for the name is that we take pictures of items and sell them online and in the store. We are located at 6 N. Main Street in Villa Grove.

2. What services do you offer?

We specialize in consignment both in store but especially online consignment. We take in items, photograph them and list them on eBay. Once the item sells we ship it to the buyer. We are also doing professional printing services, specializing in high quality invitations, flyers, business cards etc. all of the design work and printing

is done right in the store! If you're in need of Vape supplies, for example electronic cigarettes and the liquid that goes into them "juice", coils and glass, we have an entire section of the store dedicated to that.

3. Have you seen a demand for these services?

There is a high demand for online consignment. A lot of people have valuable items that they no longer want but do not have the time or know how to sell them online themselves. Selling on eBay can be very time consuming and there is quite a learning curve involved not to mention the multiple accounts that need to be set up in order to get started. We take all of the work out of it for our customers. Just come in and drop the items off and we'll take care of the rest.

As for the Vape supplies, there is a demand, as it has become a popular alternative to smoking and we are the one of the only places within a 30 minute drive to get high quality supplies.

There is always a need for design and printing services, specializing in wedding invitations, bridal shower and baby announcements, business services etc., we have obtained a high end printer and plan on keeping it busy! 4. What are some of the

and shop. Council hires TIF consultant, sets cleanup days dates

The Villa Grove city council met on March 12, 2018 for their regularly scheduled bimonthly meeting.

Mayor Gunter called the meeting to order at 6:02 pm, with Clerk Osborne calling the role. All were in attendance save alderman Stipp.

After the Pledge of Aliegiance, the council moved to go to executive session for personnel, and remained in closed session until 6:30 pm.

When the meeting reopened, the minutes from the 2/8 public works committee meeting, the 2/12 closed session, and the 2/26 regular and closed session meetings were approved.

Next, the council approved payment of claims in the amount of \$176,690.15, with all voting yes.

The council then moved to approve financial reports and after finding no public comments, moved on to the Engineering report. In the engi-

neer's absence, Mayor Gunter reported that at the Public Works committee meeting held earlier, Andy Kieser had stated that the loans for water plant construction were set to be approved in the next two weeks, and that construction was still scheduled to begin in April, with a target completion date of December.

The council then moved to regular business.

First, a vote to approve the hiring of a TIF consultant was tabled pending background checks. It was later reported at the Admin committee meeting, held on 3/15, that the firm under consideration, Moran Economic Development of Edwardsville, IL, had been fully vetted and would be hired, pending board approval.

The council then voted to approve changing office hours at city hall from 7-4 to 8-4. The move was made in order to allow the office staff an hour of uninterrupted work time each day, and passed unanimously.

Next, the council noted that the Fire Department had been able to make early loan payoff to the State Bank for the recent purchase of the brush truck, thanks to generous donations from area residents and busi-

Payment of claims in the amount of \$108.38 to Bud's Auto was then approved, with all voting yes save Aıderman Allen, who recused

himself. The council then moved to committee reports. Alderman Blaney reported that the administrative and risk management committee was looking to draft five and ten year plans for the city and that the project to update job descriptions was ongoing. She also mentioned that plans were in the making for the first "Harvest Wine Festival", to be held in October at the Main Street Tennis court.

Alderman Allen, chair of the Community Development committee, then made his report. He noted that plans were still in the offing for a Fishing tournament to be held at John Leon Park at the Reservoir. He also noted that Main Street had seen one business re-locate, one had moved in, and another was in the process of doing so.

Alderman Leon then opened his Emergency Services committee report by noting that the fire department was fully staffed for the first time in recent memory. He also noted that it was time to renew registration for golf carts. Chief Gire, who was in attendance as he normally is, noted that he would inspect vehicles at the owners' residence for those who have no way of transporting them to the station because of the restrictions that Route 130 presents.

Alderman Cheely then reported that the Franchise Development committee had set community cleanup days for June 22 and 23, and that residents should watch for

further information and developments. There was no senior center

report in Alderman Stipp's absence.

Mayor Gunter then opened her report by reminding citizens that dogs must remain on a leash at all times, per ordinance. A community member had contacted her concerning people letting their dogs run free on the Richman Park ball fields, and subsequently not cleaning up after them. She also noted that someone had told her that someone had voiced concerns about noise violations emanating from the skate park after dark, and that City Police would monitor the situation to ensure that all rules and laws were being followed. She also noted that the city hall renovation had been completed, and that the drop box was open in its former location. Finding no further business, the council moved to adjourn shortly after 7 pm.

You may also purchase a family 4 pack of tickets which includes the play and dinner for \$30.00




