Rain and a scattering of snow was evident on the Greensburg Footbridge Saturday morning. Built in the late 1920s at a cost of \$4,500, the bridge is 445 feet long, 40 feet high at its highest point, with a five feet wide plank walkway. The bridge was built to connect the public square with the L&N Railroad Depot. Prior to the bridge, train passengers faced a challenging trek to the square as described in a March 3, 1880 article from the Lebanon Weekly Standard, "The depot is separated from the business part of town by a deep ravine. We had very wholesome exercise climbing up the opposite slope." The article told of the first train ride from Lebanon to Greensburg. The train ran six days a week, leaving Lebanon at 3:05 p.m. and arriving in Greensburg at 5:50 p.m. At 6:30 a.m. the next morning the train left Greensburg to arrive in Lebanon at 9:40 a.m.
