Flood traps family; rescue is successful

Two adults, one child and six animals were rescued Sunday when water levels continually surrounded their home, according to Green County Rescue Squad Chief Nick Cheatham.

Green County E-911 Center received a phone call at 2:43 p.m. Sunday afternoon requesting assistance at 1760 Caven Bend

Water from Green River, directly behind the property, had surrounded the residence, with water inside being approximately knee-deep, Cheatham

"We used swift water rafts to get to the residence and get them to dry land," Cheatham said.

Rescuers were on the scene for just over two hours. No injuries were re-

ported. The residents will be staying with family members until they can return home. Green County Res-

"Everything went well. This could've been a lot worse," Cheatham said. "The water was high and it was swift, so it definitely could have been much worse."
