**March 25, 2009

**March 24, 1999
City water shut down** - The city was without water for a period of time due to a leak in the main water line.

Spring snow storm - Local residents woke up to see the largest snow flakes of the season Tuesday morning.

Weather statistics - The high temperature last week was 79 degrees on March 21. The daytime low was 35 degrees on March 26.

**March 28, 1969
Dog poisoners warned** - Members of the Grand Jury have warned residents about placing poison with the intent to kill dogs and other animals.

Sub-division annexation - Twenty-nine people voted to annex the Cardinal Heights Sub-division into the city limits.

Three All-Kentucky City signs were erected at the city limits of Greensburg.

The Gospel of John opens April 13 at Homeplace

The 2019 Homeplace on Green River Shakespeare in the Barn season will open April 13 at 6 p.m. with Robert Brock telling the story of the Gospel of John. Brock presents the Gospel as a storyteller, which is how early Christians shared the Bible in an age where manuscripts were hand-written, and most people could not read.

Brock, who brought Smoke on the Mountain and Shakespeare's The Two Gentlemen of Verona to the Homeplace stage last summer, is an assistant professor and director

of theater at Lindsey Wilson College. Before coming to the college, he was artistic director at the Kentucky Repertory Theater from 2002 until 2010. While there he produced 86 plays. Brock has performed The Gospel of John numerous times. He also portrays Mark Twain, and Billy Herndon, who was born in Green County and was Abraham Lincoln's law partner and a good friend.

"Think of the Gospel as a story told by a storyteller as it was brought to early Christians. That's what I bring to life—the storyteller," Brock said. "There is so much drama in the Gospel and so many interesting

and profound events. Often when I do this performance people come to me afterward and tell me it brought the scriptures to life in a way they did not know it could."

There is no ticket charge to see and hear Brock's performance, but there will be an opportunity to donate to help cover the cost of production and building maintenance.
