

# City Council considers fiscal transparency program

The Greensburg City Council met in regular session Monday evening. Mark Rini, ClearGov Market Development Executive, through a conference

call, addressed any questions regarding the ClearGov fiscal transparency program. This program enables the city to educate its citizens online through ClearGov's website concerning the city's finances and provides updates on

any new city projects and developments. The Council agreed to table the matter until the next scheduled city council meeting. "Every taxpayer should have easy access to Greensburg's finances, and ClearGov can do that for us," said

Mayor John Shuffett. Mayor Shuffett provided an update regarding the refurbishing of the Greensburg Community Center. The Center was recently vacated by the United States Postal Service after the completion of

the new post office facility constructed on Tunnel Lane. "Some wear and tear comes with the occupation of any facility, so we are working with the United States Postal Service to ensure our Community Center is re-

stored," the mayor said. City Council members also discussed a citizen concern relating to a city ordinance that involves the use of a golf cart on the streets inside the city limits. A motion to reconsider the matter was approved.

# Summersville Fire Dept. hosts training exercises Saturday

Summersville Volunteer Fire Department held a training session Saturday on the Blake Edwards farm located on Highway 323 at Summersville involving farm and grain bin rescue. Fire and rescue personnel from Breeding, Whitehouse, Tennessee and host Summersville took part in the training exercises. SVFD Training Officer Todd Price said, "The purpose of the training is to have better efficiency and knowledge of grain bin or farm rescue incidents within our community. As first

responders, we attempt to host this class every year. Our goal next year is to have the state farm agriculture training group here on-site with all of their equipment, which is mobile props, that will provide more in-depth scenario training." The training involved four scenarios including: car accident entrapment and extrication, tractor rollover entrapment and recovery, grain entrapment and extrication, and a dozer and log exercise involving entrapment and extrication. Price commented on the benefits of having such a training session. He said, "The benefits of having the train-

ing is to understand every person's abilities and to show our newest members the training that is needed for their certification and to be a more efficient fire and rescue service for our community." Air Methods of Springfield made an appearance at the training session. "We appreciate Edwards' Farms for allowing us to train hands-on each year and provide the necessary equipment and props for our annual training," said Price. The training officer also extended thanks to Breeding Fire and Rescue for providing needed equipment and to Eagle Lumber Company of Gabe for
